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Official Information Act Request for – Dog Bites

I write in response to your Official Information Act request received by us 17th April 2021, you requested the following information:

- 1. How many children aged 0-14 have presented to hospital with a dog-related injury in the last year?**
- 2. How many of those children required a procedure (e.g sutures), or admission?**
- 3. What were the ethnic and age demographics of the those children?**

Counties Manukau Health Response:

For context Counties Manukau Health (CM Health) employs over 8,500 staff and provides health and support services to people living in the Counties Manukau region (approx. 601,490 people). We see over 118,000 people in our Emergency Department each year, and over 2,000 visitors come through Middlemore Hospital daily.

Our services are delivered via hospital, outpatient, ambulatory and community-based models of care. We provide regional and supra-regional specialist services i.e. for orthopaedics, plastics, burns and spinal services. There are also several specialist services provided including tertiary surgical services, medical services, mental health and addiction services.

In response to your request, it is important to note when a patient presents to our Emergency Department for care, their presenting medical condition is recorded in our admission system, rather than necessarily the underlying cause of their condition. We do not have a specific presentation coding for the presenting condition of ‘dog bite’, however we have conducted a search for presenting symptoms of ‘dog’ as a presenting symptom in the Emergency Department and have then manually reviewed each of the numbers to identify if these were all related to a ‘dog bite’.

- 1. How many children aged 0-14 have presented to hospital with a dog-related injury in the last year?**

In the last year, between 23rd April 2020 to 22nd April 2021 there has been a total of eighty-five (85) presentations to the Emergency Department for dog bites in children (aged 0-14).

- 2. How many of those children required a procedure (e.g sutures), or admission?**

We are unable to provide the information on procedures e.g. sutures as this would require the review of individual clinical records of patients. Due to the sensitivity of this information, frontline clinical staff would need to review these individual clinical files and it would not be

appropriate to use a contractor to review the records. This would take the frontline staff away from their clinical work and prejudice our ability to provide core clinical services.

We can however provide the number of admissions of children who presented to our Emergency Department with a dog bite injury which can be found below in table 1.

3. What were the ethnic and age demographics of those children?

Tables 2 and 3 below reflect the ethnicity and age of children who have presented to the Emergency Department with a dog bite injury between 23rd April 2020 to 22nd April 2021.
